PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back to our entire community. An extra special welcome is extended to our new Year 7 cohort, newly enrolled students, families and staff. We hope you are now well settled and in the swing of things- we certainly are.

We have continued to celebrate HSC success with our highest ATAR landing at 97.8 and the majority of our KLAs featuring on the Distinguished Achiever list. Despite ongoing challenges, the Class of 2021 managed above state average performances in all courses of English, PDHPE, Visual Arts and Retail Services with overall strong results in Drama and impressive gains in Mathematics, and Band 6 performances in academically rigorous subjects including:

English Advanced, English Extension 1, English Standard, Mathematics Advanced, Mathematics Extension 1, Mathematics Standard 2, Biology, Business Studies, Legal Studies, Hospitality, Visual Arts and Community and Family Studies.

We also acknowledge the Saturday School of Languages for overseeing our student success in Chinese in Context, Arabic Continuers and Arabic Extension.

However, success is measured in a multitude of ways. Over 80% of students who applied for an ATAR at BGHS were successful in being offered early entry into at least one university course. Students who were not attempting to gain entry into university secured full time employment, traineeships and secured enrolment in the college or TAFE course that was part of their vocational plan. 100% of our students graduated with a pathway to a direct post school destination.

Our focus is to make sure our students aim high, set goals and work strategically to achieve them. Our purpose is to empower them with the knowledge and skills they require to do so. We want all our graduates to be empowered by the strength and confidence they feel in the knowledge and skills they leave with and the values they hold strong.

Year 7 have embraced their new school setting and settled successfully. The first few days of high

school were spent getting to know the school grounds, staff and each other as they engaged with fun learning activities across the school. We are looking forward to the easing of restrictions in order to welcome parents and carers onsite for a meet and greet function and discussion about their children's progress so far.

Year 12 are almost halfway through their final year and are reminded daily to invest their time wisely in order to reap the rewards of their labour. Year 11 are just commencing their two-year commitment in this culminating stage of their learning. We have specific plans for each year group in order for students to develop and be enriched. These plans excitina STEAM related activities. include opportunities to develop writing and speech as well as in sport and the creative arts. We are also very excited about the work staff across the school will be delivering to improve numeracy skills. Our new Deputy Principal, Jackie Blue, will play an important role in this work.

Student punctuality and attendance

It is vital that students arrive onsite no later than 8:15am. Citing traffic as an excuse will not be accepted. Punctuality is related to student responsibilities and commitment to learning. Students who attend late will commence detentions where they undertake active study.

Student safety (roadside and onsite)

The BGHS community is very concerned about dangerous driving and unsafe pedestrian behaviour before and most particularly, after school on Cooper Road. Students must cross the street on the crossing and should not be on their mobiles while they are walking. We also ask parents not to breach road safety rules, including stopping illegally and speeding. This includes stopping on the crossing, on the roundabout or allowing children to get in and out of vehicles when the car is not parked.

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Communication and current demands on staff and school resources

It is the responsibility of parents and students to ensure that the contact details provided to schools is accurate and updated. The school is not always able to communicate on an individual basis to our community members. We rely on a number of media and communication portals to disseminate information. If you have recently made changes to your contact details, notify the school immediately. There is a change of details form available in the Forms tab in the About our School link on the school website.

We remind all families that schools are operating under guidelines and restrictions that differ from other settings in the wider community.

In order to comply with those guidelines and restrictions, our resources have been pushed to the limit.

We are an educational institution, tasked with the responsibility of educating your children. In response to broader social and health issues, we have had to also dedicate significant time and resources to meet those additional requirements.

Additionally, all decisions made in relation to the logistical operations of the school are the result of deep understanding of intricate details relating to managing a site that looks after up to 1000 individuals at any time it is open.

If you have concerns or would like to express your feelings about a matter, we are ready to listen and, if there is capacity, respond to those concerns. We are solutions focused at all times. However, we will not respond to anger, hostility or abuse. This is unjustified and will not be tolerated.

REPORT FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

As we begin 2022, the Deputies wish every student from Year 7 to Year 12 success in meeting all the challenges which await you this year. Now is the time to set your short and long term goals so that each of you can achieve your *personal best*! We trust that this will be a year during which each student can take pride in her academic growth and in the personal excellence she is able to apply to all areas of her life.

This year we will be continuing our focus on student wellbeing and self-reflection. We will be continuing with The Resilience Project this year for all year groups every Tuesday in our Wellbeing period. Throughout this project we share the benefits of Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness, and easy ways to practise these in everyday life. The 2022 student diaries provide specific resources for the teaching of practical skills. We encourage you to take some time to peruse your daughter's diary. Students are also required to reflect on their learning at the end of every week during the Friday roll call period and formally address the following questions in their school diaries:

'What went well this week and why?' and 'What do I need to improve / work on next week?'

The aims of self-reflection are for students to increase their self-awareness and self-regulation surrounding their own learning. Reflection on school work enhances its meaning and clarifies learning. Self-reflection will also provide an opportunity for students to evaluate their own personal driving force towards their learning - a recognition or affirmation of personal core beliefs and values.



There are many opportunities available at Birrong GHS for your daughter to be involved in and develop her own personal skills along the way. Year 11 students are preparing and working hard to begin their role as Peer Support leaders supporting the Year 7 students and developing communication, organisational and leadership skills of their own. This program has been slightly delayed due to the COVID year group zoning processes.

Year 7 started high school with a week of activities aimed at welcoming them and assisting with getting to know how our school works. Many of our students received achievement awards for their participation and demonstration of our school values. We are looking forward to working with them as they journey through the remainder of the year.

Year 7 and Year 8 students are undergoing annual Best Start and Check-in testing programs in literacy and numeracy, run by the Department of Education, in order to assist us to identify strengths and weaknesses and continue to support our students' learning.

Year 9 students continue to participate in their mandatory courses but have also begun working in their elective classes. This is an important step that empowers students to take some control over the direction of their education by selecting courses they have an interest in and want to experience more of.

Year 10 has become a part of our senior school and as a result we have even greater expectations of them, their behaviour and their commitment to their learning. We have already begun our preparations to ensure they are eligible for the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) and they will be revising their subject selection and personal details to ensure our records are accurate before we progress further. It is critical that they know their address, as well as their own phone number and a parent number. Your help with this would be very much appreciated.

Year 12 are now into their second term of the HSC. They are encouraged to make the most out of their learning time by actively engaging in their lessons and asking questions. This includes planning their study lessons efficiently when they are in the Senior Study Centre, supervised by our dedicated learning support teachers. Students in Year 12 must be prepared for success with regular homework and study sessions at home as well as seeking the support of their classroom teachers. This means committing at least 3-4 hours each night to this goal.

It is important that your daughter attend school and is in the correct uniform at all times. Our uniform consists of black lace up hard leather traditional school shoes, crew length white socks, navy blue hijab and white bond, school tunic, skirt or pants and the school blouse must be worn at all times especially under the school jumper. Finger nails must be kept short in order to meet work, health and safety requirements at school and of a clear colour only. Acrylic nails, makeup and eyelash applications are not permissible.

The school competitors' only swimming carnival was held on Monday 14 February at Birrong Leisure Centre. All girls who participated showed true courage, determination and sportsmanship. We wish all the girls representing our school at the Zone carnival on Friday 25 February all the very best of luck.



The safety of our students travelling to and from school is important to us. You will often see us at the railway station and the school crossing supervising students as they enter and leave our school. We ask you to partner with us to ensure your daughters are safe by abiding by the school zone road rules before and after school each day.

At the start of the new school year it is an important time to remind everyone about the Transport Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) seven school zone offences aimed at improving pedestrian safety around schools. For example, stopping on a pedestrian crossing in a school zone carries a fine of \$330 and a loss of 2 demerit points. Queuing across an intersection in a school zone, including roundabouts, will incur a \$439 fine and a loss of 2 demerit points. The picture below shows some of the other fines and demerits in school zones.



Our school website is updated regularly with information, photos and videos that showcase student success. The school calendar provides details of events and excursions. New information will be added as the school year progresses.

We'd like to introduce you to Ms Blue, our new Deputy Principal Mathematics and Numeracy Development. Ms Blue joins us from the NSW Mathematics Strategy at the Department of Education. CAREERS NEWS

Careers Google classrooms

Years 10, 11 and 12 students must join and regularly check their Careers Google classrooms. Important careers news/events, information and resources are continually being updated and delivered via these classrooms. Students have been sent numerous reminders and emails regarding how to join. If they are not on this platform they will miss out on vital careers programs. If students need help with this please see Ms Wailes or Ms Shinas ASAP.

USI and TFN

If any student is thinking about joining the workforce or applying for tertiary education they must apply for a USI (unique student identifier) and a TFN (tax file number). You need both of these numbers to gain employment and apply for HECS/VET fee help when going to uni/TAFE/college. It is a simple process and students (particularly Year 12) are encouraged to apply before they finish school. You only have to do the application once. Make sure it is stored somewhere safe.

Your USI (Unique Student Identifier) is your individual education number for life. It also creates an online record of your Australian training achievements.

TFN -

A tax file number (TFN) is free and identifies you for tax and superannuation purposes. It's yours for life. You keep the same TFN even if you change your name, change jobs, move interstate or go overseas.

JobJump

JobJump is a careers website for high schools that we subscribe to annually. Every student and parent/carer here at Birrong Girls High School is able to register and join for free. We would like you to register on JobJump so you will receive news on the careers you like sent to your home email address. It may only take one bit of news to unlock and inspire you towards your future career. Plus you will be able to use all parts of the JobJump website to help plan and achieve your career dreams. It is there to help you through to an extra year after your Year 12.

To register with JobJump, go to the front screen of the website at www.jobjump.com.au Click on I'm New. On the new screen, enter into the first white box the first letters of your school's name and when the full name appears just below in blue, click on your blue school name and it will enter automatically into the first white box. In the second white box, enter your school password which is: **puppies** and click Continue. You then need to enter a few details and set your Personal Password. (Min 6 characters). So whenever you then come back to Login to JobJump, all you will then need is your email address and Personal Password.

Student Assistance Scheme

Families experiencing financial difficulties due to unemployment or being on a pension can be assisted via school funds to purchase school uniform items and make payments for excursions and subject fees. The payment of General Contributions can be negotiated to be paid in instalments over the year.

Parents need to make an appointment to speak to Ms Dabaja to discuss their financial difficulties. Parents must be able to show that there is financial need by having their Pensioner Concession card or Centrelink card etc.

School Uniform Policy

Our school uniform policy outlines and clearly demonstrates the uniform items that our students are expected to wear on a daily basis. Uniform items can be purchased online on our school website in the *Make a Payment* section. Please check the uniform items list and size guide on the school website prior to ordering online.

Our uniform includes enclosed black hard leather school shoes for safety, especially when working in the Science laboratories, art studios and kitchens.

For students who wear long sleeves the school has a long sleeved blouse. Wearing a short sleeved blouse with a long sleeved undergarment is **not** considered to be part of the uniform and is not acceptable.

It is expected that students have more than one school outfit and that their uniform items are washed and ironed regularly so that they are in a clean uniform at all times. The hems on school trousers and skirts should be neatly sewn. For safety the hems of pants and long skirts should not drag on the floor and should not be ragged or torn.

Being in full school uniform demonstrates a student's respect for her school community, commitment to being a positive member of it and enhances the good image of our school.

Elevate Education Study Skills Program

Elevate Education will be delivering customised study skills seminars to all our students in Term 1.

- Years 10, 11 and 12 will have 2 seminar topics
- Years 7, 8 and 9 will have one seminar topic
- Students will be provided with access to the Elevate Education website throughout the year and will be able to use the online resources to assist them with study, assignments, exams and HSC subjects content.
- The cost of the seminars will be notified in a parent note closer to the time.

Year 12 students will participate in HSC preparation seminars on 3 March during periods 2 and 3, which will focus on study strategies for the preparation of assessments and examinations and on techniques to assist students to be effective learners and to cope better with Trial and HSC examinations.

Year 11 students will participate in HSC preparation seminars on 10 March during periods 2 and 3, which will focus on effective learning strategies and study techniques to enhance students' performance as a senior student.

Year 10 students will participate in seminars on 24 March during periods 2 and 3 which will focus on time management and study strategies. Years 7, 8 and 9 students will participate in a seminar that focuses on study skills, memory skills and time management to build positive study habits and enhance motivation in students. The scheduled times are:

Year 7 - 17 March in period 2 Year 8 - 16 March in period 2 Year 9 - 17 March in period 3.

All students must attend these very beneficial seminars, which are of a reasonable cost to families as the school pays for a part of the cost. A note with details about the seminars will be issued to students closer to the time.

School Vaccination Program (NOT for COVID)

Our school is participating in the NSW Adolescent Vaccination Program for Year 7, Year 8, Year 10 and Year 11 students.

- Year 7 will be offered a 2 dose course of the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) vaccination for cervical cancer prevention at visits 1 and 3, and a single dose of Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis (Whooping Cough) vaccine (Boostrix) at Visit 1.
- Year 8 students will complete the 2021 vaccines at visit 1.
- Year 10 will be offered a single dose of Meningococcal ACWY vaccine at visit 2.
- Year 11 students who had signed the consent form last year for the Meningococcal ACWY vaccine will be able to receive in at visit 2.

The vaccinations will be provided over 3 visits on the following dates:

Visit 1 on 22 March for Year 7 students (Dose 1 of HPV) and Year 8 (Dose 2 of HPV from last year's program)

Visit 2 on 22 July for Year 10 students and Year 11 students (single dose of Meningococcal vaccine)

Visit 3 on 18 November for Year 7 students (Dose 2 of HPV and a single dose of Boostrix (Diptheria, Tetanus and Pertussis)

The students will be issued the Parent Information Kit which includes the vaccination consent form closer to the time. Parents/ guardians should read the information provided with the consent form to understand the facts about the vaccines that will be offered. Information in languages other than English is available at

https://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/page s/school_vaccination_language.aspx No student will be vaccinated without the signed original consent form.

After the vaccination students will be given a Record of Vaccination card to take home to keep their immunisation/vaccination records up to date. Please keep vaccination records in a safe place as they may be required for future work or travel.

On that note, we want to acknowledge our pleasing success in our Advanced (Ms Andrews/Ms Bolanca), and Standard (Ms Reid) and Extension (Ms Bolanca and Ms Caravas) English achievements in the HSC. Notably our Drama class had extraordinary success under Ms Legg's creative and diligent tutelage. As a collaborative faculty, we continue to seek to build on these gains.
