Dear Parents,

Secretary's School Achievement Award

On Wednesday 13 September our school was formally presented with the Secretary's School Achievement Award for Improved Achievement and Engagement Outcomes at



the William Wilkins Gallery in Sydney.

This prestigious award recognises the significant role the school has played in improving student performance from Years 7 – 12.

The award celebrates our aspirational culture which, underpinned by a focus on professional learning, enhanced support services for students and increased

community partnerships, has delivered significant improvement in literacy and numeracy from Year 7 to Year 9, as well as outstanding student performance in the HSC.

Congratulations to our dedicated staff and students whose commitment and hard work have delivered outstanding growth in student achievement. I also acknowledge the vital role our parents play in this significant success.

Excellent NAPLAN results

In May this year all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 across Australia were tested in a series of literacy and numeracy tests. The school's NAPLAN results this year have again been very pleasing.

The results for Year 7 indicate that since their test in Year 5 the girls have made good progress in literacy and numeracy. Particularly pleasing is the strong growth in writing and numeracy.

Congratulations to our Year 9 girls on their strong growth in all facets of literacy and numeracy. The results show that the growth in both literacy and numeracy since they were tested in Year 7 has far exceeded the average rate across the state.

While these results are very pleasing, there can be no room for complacency. Teachers will continue to work with students to support improvement, using NAPLAN data to tailor teaching and learning practices to better meet the needs of all students and specifically those students not yet meeting national benchmarks. Parents of girls in Year 7 and 9 have received the results of the NAPLAN tests for their daughter and should contact the school if they wish to discuss any aspects of their daughter's progress.

Thank you to our talented teachers and School Learning Support Officers who, along with supportive parents, have worked with our students to develop critical skills in literacy and numeracy.

This is a very special occasion on the school calendar; it marks the transformation of the bright eyed Year 7 students of 2012, into confident, independent young women ready to embrace the challenges of the future.

REPORT FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

Welcome back to Term 4, a time to work hard towards future goals.

The online 'Tell Them From Me – Partners in Learning' Parent Survey was available for all parents and carers from Monday 4 – Friday 8 September. Many thanks to those people who responded. Our response rate increased again this year with 140 parents, carers and community members providing vital feedback that will help us to strengthen the important relationship between parents and our school.

The school's website is updated regularly with videos and photographs showing the range of educational experiences in which our students participate. The calendar now includes the full range of activities on our school schedule. We urge you to visit the site often to learn more about what happens in our learning environments.

We wish all the 2017 Year 12 students the very best as they embark on their HSC examinations. These examinations bring to a close their secondary schooling and prepare them for continued success in future endeavours.

Our Year 11 students have completed their Preliminary Year examinations and they have already begun their preparation for the HSC in 2018. Students have received their reports and should spend some time reflecting on their performance and are encouraged to seek assistance from their teachers to identify how they could achieve improvement. The Year 12 Handbook has been distributed and students are encouraged to plan their term carefully, taking note of when assessment tasks are due and ensuring that they are well organised to complete all required work.

Students are reminded to adhere to school procedures for assessment tasks and examinations which are explained in the handbook. Nightly study habits and a clear focus

on completing work to develop deep understanding are essential in achieving the best possible future outcomes. It is also important that students achieve a balance between family, study and extracurricular activities. Students should get the right amount of sleep and rest, as this often impacts on the effectiveness of their study routines. If students are experiencing difficulty in maintaining a balance, or need assistance with setting goals, we encourage them to be proactive and seek help from Ms Hawk, Ms Lazarevski, Ms Salvagio or Ms Tselepi.

Throughout Term 4 Year 10 students are expected to continue working diligently, making sure they complete all class and assessment tasks to a high standard to ensure they achieve all course outcomes. Students should also be preparing for their Year 10 formal exams which will be held during Week 6. All Year 10 students have now chosen their Preliminary HSC subjects for Year 11. Some students will need to reflect on their selections and consider if their choices are best suited to their capabilities and future career aspirations. It is important that students listen to advice and make decisions which will allow them to achieve to the best of their ability. For some students, the prospect of gaining a traineeship or apprenticeship (working and undergoing training whilst being paid) may be a more appealing and appropriate pathway. Parents of Year 10 students considering an alternate pathway are encouraged to make an appointment to discuss the best options and opportunities for success post Year 10 with Ms Shinas, the school's Transition Teacher or Mr Mouzakis, Careers Adviser.

Year 9 students received their NAPLAN results in late August. These results allow parents to reflect on some areas of their daughter's progress in literacy and numeracy and allow teachers to plan to further develop literacy and numeracy skills through targeted teaching practices. NAPLAN was the first of a number of opportunities these students have to demonstrate a minimum standard of reading, writing and numeracy to receive the HSC in 2020. Some of our students did achieve the minimum standard of Band 8 but it is expected that most students across the state will demonstrate the HSC minimum standard by passing new, short online reading, writing and numeracy tests in Year 10, 11 or 12.

There are a number of excursions planned for our Year 9 students this term including the annual Science trip to Questacon in Canberra and the Luna Park Mathematics excursion. Food Technology, Geography, Commerce and Japanese students will also travel to venues outside the school to experience real-life opportunities that enhance their classroom learning.

All Year 8 students have selected their Year 9 elective subjects for 2018. These electives will continue to be studied in Year 10 2019. All students will be involved in the Year 8 VALID (Science) online testing which is scheduled at the start of Week 5 and then participate in the PDHPE swim school program at the end of Week 5.

Year 7 students also received their NAPLAN results in late August. To improve, it is vital that parents provide an environment that encourages regular reading which will assist students to improve their comprehension as well as vocabulary.

The Year 7 Field Day is fast approaching and all students are getting ready to participate in their first interschool sports gala day that fosters teamwork and sportsmanship. Later in the term, Year 7 students will attend the annual swim school where they will be instructed by qualified Austswim instructors supported by our PDHPE teachers.

Parents are reminded that the Homework Centre is available after school for students to complete work and seek assistance when they experience difficulty. It operates on Monday through Thursday and is supervised by qualified teachers from the school. This term will be a busy time studying for and completing assessment tasks, and preparing for yearly examinations. Now is the time to work especially hard to ensure that reports reflect students' efforts and capabilities.

Every day your daughter should be spending a minimum of 2 hours on her homework, assignments and revision as well as extra time for study and reading. To help students, parents should discuss their work and outwardly show interest in their learning. This could involve regularly asking them about their learning and helping them to establish a study plan to achieve their goals. Successful students always identify family support as a key element to achieving their success and acknowledge the support accordingly.

HEAD TEACHER ADMINISTRATION REPORT

Contact Details - Over the year many families have changed their personal and contact details because they have moved house or obtained a new mobile phone number. It is very important that you inform the school immediately of any changes you make. There have been several incidents at school where the school has needed to contact parents in an emergency and have not had the most up to date contact numbers.

Student Attendance - To assist in the effective management of student attendance across the school, we request that you make contact with the school when your daughter is absent either by return text message or by phone **on the day they are absent**. This ensures the school knows exactly what is happening and where your daughter is on that day.

Attendance Accountability - Your daughter is required to hand in any notes or medical certificates explaining her absence from school to me if you did not reply via text or phone call. If your daughter does not supply a note as the last resort to explain her absence it will be reflected as an "unexplained absence" on her school report at the end of this year.

Early Leaver Passes - Parents who wish their daughters to leave school early for medical appointments must provide a written note including contact details, for their daughter to bring to school. This note must be presented to the Head Teacher Administration before 8:20AM on the day the student needs to leave early. After this time, parents will be required to come to the school and sign their daughters out at the front office.

Lateness to School - A reminder that <u>lessons</u> begin at 8:30AM at Birrong Girls High School. It is important to note that when a student is late to school, this not only affects the learning of the student that is late, but also the learning of every student in the class, as the lesson must be interrupted so the teacher can address the issue. Students that are persistently late to school will have consequences given to them.

Skoolbag App - We now have our own Skoolbag App to help us communicate more effectively with our school community. Skoolbag delivers school notices directly to parents and students free of charge. To install the free Birrong Girls High Skoolbag App, search for our school name on either the Apple App Store or Google Play Store. For Windows Phone, and Windows 8.1 or 10 users, search for Skoolbag in the Windows store.

CAREERS NEWS

The Oxford Dictionaries' definition of life states 'It is the condition that distinguishes animals and plants from inorganic matter, including the capacity for growth, activity and continual change'. In addition, 'a 15 year old today will experience a portfolio career, potentially having 17 different jobs over 5 careers in their lifetime' according to the report from the Foundation for Young Australians (FYA). These two facts have resulted in Year 12 being extremely busy over the past two months working out what they would like to do and how they can ultimately achieve this end goal.

Many discussions occurred with students over potential careers. Talks revolved around university choices as well as other pathways to these end goals. Now that this is complete it is time to place all their energy into the HSC exams.

Late last term, we had the honour of welcoming Dr Brad Tucker to Birrong Girls High School to chat to our Physics and Chemistry students. Dr Tucker is a Professor of Astrophysics from the Australian National University who combines that role with working for NASA at the Mount Stromlo Observatory. A very informative discussion ensued about the stars, planets and all things space and time.

The Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN) is a not for profit organisation that connects businesses with students through mentoring programs. Twenty of our Year 10 students were fortunate to participate in one of their programs in which they partnered with Optus. This program is designed to equip students with the necessary practical skills needed to engage in employment options beyond school through the development of their interview skills. This may additionally help those students wishing to apply for university as some options have an interview component as part of the selection process.

AMNESTY WORKSHOPS



On 11 September, during periods 2 and 3, the Birrong Girls Amnesty members from Years 7 to 11 attended a Refugee and Women's Rights Workshop. The workshop was run by three Amnesty International members, Bani Singh, Elaine Yeo and Mon Mon, and was supervised by Ms Zomaya and Mr Sarna. We were guided through the workshop by passionate advocates for refugee and women's rights and were actively involved through questions, activities and discussions.

It was an enriching experience which fostered emotions of sympathy and gratefulness in our Amnesty members, and allowed for an insight on less fortunate people's lives and situations. We learnt about the hardships women and refugees face constantly and were informed of the many social barriers placed against women in our society today in areas of employment, education and rights. As a result of this informative workshop we were inspired to make changes on our own community.

All members were actively engaged in the workshop and were included in many activities. During the initial stages of the workshop, our Year 7-9 Amnesty members were split into three groups. Each group was given a piece of butcher's paper and a topic of controversy. We were told to create spiral maps, explaining how overlooked issues can lead to serious societal dilemmas. The spiral maps we created canvassed the inequality of women in employment, legally, in courts and medically. Our mind maps relied heavily on the five health components, these being: mental, spiritual, physical, emotional and social health and conveyed the impact of discrimination and stereotyping on women's health.

Another inclusive activity we participated in was a court role play displaying the injustices of the law towards refugees. Different situations were illustrated to us with the difficulty of communication, due to language difference, stressed. We were spoken to and made to

understand the difference between an immigrant and a refugee.

The final part of the workshop consisted of a series of videos illustrating the gender stereotypes placed on young girls, and explored how we can overcome limitations by performing small acts in our community. We were encouraged to create small groups and raise awareness of the issues we learnt about, giving students an opportunity to demonstrate initiative outside of school.

The workshop was an enriching and inspiring experience for all members of the Amnesty team as we enjoyed an interactive and educational workshop.


