REPORT FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

As the school year for 2023 draws to a close, it is a great time to reflect on personal and whole school community achievements especially this year with the many challenges we have all faced.

First and foremost is our school commitment to the delivery of Quality Teaching. Birrong Girls High School teachers take enormous pride in the quality of the teaching which occurs in each classroom. Our ongoing dedication towards the Quality Teaching Framework supported by the partnership with the University of Newcastle continues to consolidate the effectiveness of lesson delivery, assessment of student understanding and assists teachers to improve the value of teacher feedback to students and parents/carers. We have continued to strengthen student writing through the use of ALARM and the use of HSC High Leverage Strategies supported by teacher professional learning.

We hope our parent and carer community will join with us for our School Presentation Day being held at Bankstown Sports Club on Wednesday 13 December. This will be a time to acknowledge and celebrate the great achievements of so many of our students.

Year 7 students had an exciting and fun-filled day when they visited Luna Park this term, which was the icing on the cake following their engagement in the STEAM (Science, Technology and Visual Arts) Project which centred around forces and a rollercoaster design. We congratulate the students who won the rollercoaster challenge from 7G – Ehsan Hamed, Lily Tran and Rahila Mousawi.

Year 8 students participated in the VALID online Science testing during Week 3 and have finalised their elective subjects for 2024.

Years 7, 8 and 9 have completed NSW Department of Education Check-In assessments in literacy and numeracy as part of the school's monitoring of students'

core skills and knowledge. This data will be used to inform teaching and learning programs in 2024.

Year 10 students have completed their yearly examinations but remain hard at work as they complete 'All My Own Work', a mandatory NESA requirement for all students entering Year 11. Year 10 students concluded the year with leadership training to be able to sign up and participate as a Year 11 mentor in the Peer Support Training program. During Week 8 all students completed one week of work experience following their week of leadership activities.

Year 11 participated in the compulsory Life Ready program on Friday 17 November. The day provided students with a greater understanding of the consequences, both positive and negative, of personal choices in various life situations. The students experienced presentations by young adults whose lives have been affected by risk taking behaviours and poor life choices. Students have officially begun their HSC courses across all subjects. Parents were invited to a workshop 'Welcome to the HSC: Parent Edition' on Thursday 30 November – to explore how to support student undertaking he HSC. Thanks to parents who engaged with this important session.

Year 12 have officially signed out of school and attended their formal on 16 November. The night was a wonderful celebration, the end of this chapter of their lives. We wish them all the very best with their future endeavours. The HSC results and ATAR notifications will be released on Thursday 14 December. We look forward to seeing and hearing from the girls on the 14 December for our HSC Celebration Morning Tea from 9:30am – 10:30am!

The last day of the year for all students is Friday 15 December. All students are expected to be at school on time every day in full school uniform up until that day.

Student of the Month Awards





BIRRONG GIRLS ATTEND THE NSW PARLIAMENT YOUTH SUMMIT



On 19 October 8 SRC students joined over 100 students from 16 schools across NSW to discuss ways to combat prejudice and foster an inclusive, cohesive country at the Together for Humanity (TFH) NSW Youth Summit, held at the Parliament of NSW and St Stephen's Uniting Church.

Schools involved represented a cross section of NSW's Independent, Catholic and Government sectors with Catholic, Islamic, Jewish and other faiths represented.

Each school was given an opportunity to voice their ideas around the summit's theme 'Diversity and Connection', making presentations on real-world issues experienced and suggesting solutions to inspire unity.

The Birrong Girls team consisting of; Shrouq Abu-Aguleh, Alexis Acheampong, Bassma Alameddine, Sarah Ali, Saira Ali Zada, Souraya Kamaleddine, Precious Sukpen and Gabriella Wright, wanted to address the issue of providing services for migrant women affected by domestic violence. Their presentation focused on the idea of taking advantage of existing school relationships through the development of more community hubs in schools to create safe spaces where victims could gain access to information, support and services.

Dr Phil Lambert, CEO of Together for Humanity (TFH), commended our presenters for a "professionally executed and well-researched presentation on an emotive topic." Special mention must also be given to Precious Sukpen who had the daunting task of sharing the broader group's ideas to our NSW members of Parliament. Throughout the day, students engaged in open communication with peers and formed meaningful connections across diverse cultures, faiths and backgrounds. There were opportunities for collaboration. where students workshopped proposals on how to make Australia a country free from prejudice, which were presented to politicians and community leaders. They also heard from keynote speakers including journalist Amelia Moseley (ABC's Behind the News and BTN High) and young Gomeroi student Noah Smith the 2023 Northern Beaches Young Citizen of the Year, the Youth Speak Out Against Racism (SOAR), Premier of the Y NSW Youth Parliament and a member of the Federal First Nations Youth Advisory Group. TFH is an inclusive educational organisation focused on fostering intercultural understanding within school communities and helping students to navigate differences by seeing past stereotypes.

"By empowering young people and giving them the tools to challenge prejudice, we can help them to shape a more tolerant society," said Together For Humanity Dean and Founder Rabbi Zalman Kastel AM. "The Youth Summit offers a chance for their views to be heard and for them to listen."

Schools involved represent NSW's Independent, Catholic and Government sectors, with Catholic, Islamic, Jewish and other faiths represented. Government schools that attended were The Forest High School, Birrong Girls High School, Inner Sydney High School, Pendle Hill High School, Broken Hill High School, Willyama High School (Broken Hill), Asquith Girls High School, St George Girls High School and Barrenjoey High School.

The Amy Gillett Foundation is Australia's leading cycling safety organisation. We're dedicated to making bike riding safe for everyone in the community, and making it easier for people to choose to ride a bike.

We're reaching out to Birrong Girls High School because in the past 40 years, the percentage of children who walk or ride to school has dropped from 75% to 25%. And we know that one of the top reasons why parents hold their kids back from riding to school is because of safety concerns.

We want to help turn this trend around by **making it safe** for kids and families around Australia to ride their bike for all sorts of trips.

The Amy Gillett Foundation was recently successful in securing \$6 million from the Australian Government to roll out our <u>Safe Roads for Safe Cycling program</u>. As part

of this program, we're undertaking a range of projects designed to make our streets safe for people in the community who want to ride a bike, especially our most vulnerable road users like children.

One part of this program is BikeSpot 2023 – an interactive map which allows anyone to mark where they feel safe or unsafe while riding their bike. You can view the map and make your mark at: <u>bikespot.org</u>

As the largest ever crowdsourcing bike safety project in Australia, BikeSpot is an incredibly exciting project which gives you the power to have input into cycling safety upgrades in your neighbourhood.

We've already had 20,000 contributions to the map since it launched last month, and we would love to see Birrong Girls High School get involved.



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


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Tap on and tap off every time

because it tells us how many people are using public transport. This allows us to better plan services for you.

It is a condition of the School Pass Terms and the Student Codes of Conduct when travelling that students in possession of the School Opal card must tap on and tap off every time when using public transport to travel to and from school. Per section 3.2 of the Opal Privacy Policy, Transport for NSW collects information from taps on and taps off to support coordination, planning and policy development for transport, transport services and transport infrastructure.
