REPORT FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS

Every year we ask parents and carers to complete the 'Tell Them From Me - Partners in Learning Parent' survey. This survey asks questions about student wellbeing and engagement. The information provided by parents and carers helps us to understand more about your child's experience at school. You can help us to confirm our school's areas of strength as well as areas for us to focus on in the future. The survey is anonymous and only takes around 15 minutes to complete on a computer, tablet or smart phone. The parent survey asks a range of questions related to the following areas:

- feeling welcome
- being informed
- being supported with learning at home
- parents' participation at school
- how the school supports positive behaviour
- student safety
- inclusion
- how the school supports student learning.

Our school survey will be open from Monday 9 October to Friday 20 October 2023 (Weeks 1 and 2, Term 4). We will provide the link for the survey via text direct to you and also on our social media sites.

Year 12 students have completed their Trial examinations. It is very important for all students to use the critical teacher feedback in preparation for their HSC examination next term. This is a time for Year 12 to modify their study habits and make the necessary changes as they travel towards the HSC. After all study notes are complete, students should be engaging in past papers and send the completed questions to their teachers for feedback regarding content and writing style. Motivation will be the key and it is very important for our students to keep their eye on the prize.

Helpful tips for Preparing for HSC exams

A little bit of strategy and some good time management will make these months – even the final days before exams – all the more productive.

Sticking to your study schedule while allowing for breaks will help you manage your time.

Stick to a study schedule

We've all heard it before: the evidence shows cramming isn't very effective.

Here's how to create a well-balanced schedule:

- On a weekly or fortnightly schedule, mark down all your commitments like work, social occasions and sports activities.
- Add blocks of study time 20-minute chunks for the most effective use of your brain.
- Allocate time for exercise and relaxation.
- Don't plan to study when you should be sleeping. Sleep helps us to concentrate, remember things and keeps us energised.

Reduce the distractions

Whether it's the notifications popping up on your phone or a noisy study space, make sure you sort out the distractions before you buckle down into study mode.

- Switch your phone to 'Do Not Disturb' mode during study sessions or just switch it off.
- Choose a background sound that works for you – whether that's music, white noise or just plain silence.
- Find a space and time that will allow you to concentrate without being interrupted.

Year 11 students have commenced their Year 11 Final Examinations. In Term 4 they will officially begin their Year 12 course of study. All Year 11 students need to ensure they understand the importance of this year and set up effective study habits that will ensure their success leading to their HSC exams in 2024. Year 11 students are also in the process of electing the Prefect body who will lead our school from Term 4 this year and into 2024. All Prefects must demonstrate the Core Values of our school and follow our Code of Behaviour.

Year 10 students attended *bstreetsmart*, an initiative of the Trauma Service at Westmead Hospital. The event aims to reduce the fatality and injury rates of young people by promoting safe behaviours as drivers, riders and passengers. The interactive event is based around a car crash involving young people. It is very confronting and successfully communicates messages about the potential deadly impact of driver *and* passenger behaviour. As many of your daughters are (or will soon be) old enough to become learner drivers we encourage you to talk to them about this experience.

Year 10 students have also completed the subject selection process for Year 11, 2024. All students will receive a personalised letter confirming their selections and the learning charges associated with the different courses. They should be preparing for their Year 10 final exams which will be held mid Term 4. Year 10 students are expected to keep working at a consistent pace for the remainder of the year, making sure they complete all class and assessment tasks to a high standard to ensure no warning letters are sent home.

Year 8 students have completed the process of selecting their two elective subjects for Year 9 and Year 10. Our elective program provides students with the opportunity to supplement their mandatory courses of study with courses in which they have a particular interest. All Year 8 students have received their personalised letters indicating their 2024 elective courses.

Year 7 will engage in the 21st Century Skills Development Day on Monday 4 September. It is a day filled with team challenges, building collaboration, communication and problem-solving skills. On Tuesday 5 September, the Year 7 Rollercoaster Challenge will be launched, and students have been working together to plan, design and build a working model rollercoaster. Stay tuned for the results of this showcase in our next edition.

Year 7 will also be engaging in their Field Day on 18 October. This is a fun sports gala day where the girls play a variety of sports with other girls' schools from the area.

All students should be practising their GEM skills (Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness) every day to build positive learning environments, mindsets and peer relationships.

REPORT FROM THE HEAD TEACHER ADMINISTRATION

The text messaging system is a very valuable tool in tracking student attendance. If your daughter has been late to or absent from school, you would have received a text message from the school that asks you for a reply text. It is very important that you make contact with the school as soon as possible via text reply or phone call so your daughter's school records can be updated to justify her absence.

The effectiveness of the text messaging system in ensuring the safety of your daughter relies on you responding to the text by explaining the nature of your daughter's absence, her name and roll call class.

If you have any concerns about the text messaging system please contact the school.

Any parents and students that intend on taking leave to travel for holidays must contact the school office prior to departing and document the length of time they will be away.

Over the year many families have changed their personal and contact details because they have moved house, changed telephone companies or obtained a new mobile phone number. It is very important that you inform the school immediately of any changes you make. There have been several incidents at school where the school has needed to contact parents in an emergency and have not had the most up to date contact numbers.

If you change your mobile phone details it is very important that you inform the school straight away.

Early Leaver Passes – Parents who wish their daughters to leave school early for medical appointments must provide a written note including contact details, for their daughter to bring to school. This note must be presented to the Reception Office <u>before 8:20 AM</u> on the day the student needs to leave early. After this time, parents will be required to come to the school and sign their daughters out at the Reception Office. Students will be required to obtain and submit a medical certificate to the Reception Office on the next day they return to school, in order for the partial absence to be justified on the roll system.

Lateness to School

A reminder that **lessons begin at 8:30 AM** at Birrong Girls High School. This means that students need to **be at school by 8:20 AM**. It is important to note that when a student is late to school, this not only affects the learning of the student that is late, but also the learning of every student in the class, as the lesson must be interrupted so the teacher can address the issue. After school detentions exist for students that are persistently late to school.

SkoolBag App

We are now in the process of decommissioning the SkoolBag App (now called Audiri). Effective immediately, this app will no longer be used by the school to send out information. REMINDER- Online consent for school vaccination

If your daughter is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their school vaccinations.

In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

- 1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit: https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school
- Follow the steps to log in to your existing ServiceNSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a <u>ServiceNSW</u> account, refer to <u>ServiceNSW</u> to create one.
- 3. Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your daughter(s). You will need to:
 - a) Enter your daughter's personal details
 - b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your daughter
 - c) Read the <u>linked Parent Information</u> <u>Sheet and privacy statement</u>
 - d) Provide consent

If you or your daughter do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form from our school reception office or from Ms Rilkovski.

The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

CAREERS NEWS

Year 10

Year 10 participated in the very important process of Subject Selections as soon as they returned from the school holidays. All students completed Careers lessons, participated in the Subject Market, and attended the Information Session with Ms George. Students and families were provided with the opportunity of researching subjects of interest prior to making selections for senior courses to start in 2024 which will see students achieve goals by the end of 2025.

During Week 4 we successfully completed the compulsory Parent/Carers/Teacher interview sessions which provided the opportunity for everyone to discuss subject choices and suitability to each young person. This process ensured that

everyone was on board with future selections and pathways.

Finally, the last step in the process was completed on 18 August when students submitted their forms. So far throughout this process, students have been engaged, inquisitive and positive, which indicates that they are taking this important process very seriously. We thank the students and their parents/carers for their interest and participation. I look forward to working with Year 10 as they enter their final years of education and begin pathway planning for their future careers.

Year 10 will begin the Work Experience process this Friday with all documents for students, parents and employers being issued out on Friday 1 September. Students will be engaging in a Leadership program in November during Week 7 of Term 4 involving the compulsory course taught by Mr Davidson, "All My Own Work". Following this in Week 8 starting on 27 November, students will be at work experience, gaining experience in the world of employment. Parents are to read all the information provided and support their daughter in selecting their provider for a great experience into the real world of work. This is also a great opportunity for students to receive part time work provided they select a working environment that is hiring. Showcasing excellent behaviour, hard work, a positive attitude, being punctual, courteous and respectful is a must, and this may be the difference in achieving a part time job or not. The forms will be due back Week 1, Term 4, 9 October, providing everyone with enough time to find a provider. We would like to see our students succeed in the

workforce and this is a wonderful opportunity for students to gain insights on the reality of employment. Please do not hesitate to contact the school should you have any questions.

Year 11

Year 11 students have begun engaging in university programs such as U@Uni, UNSW Gateway programs and the WSU Fast Forward Program. These are great programs for students to get a head start into the life of a university student. Students will be involved in school holiday programs and provided with many real-life experiences on campus.

On the Year 11 Google Classroom page, information about opportunities and workshops presented at universities over the break have been advertised. Students should begin attending university days to familiarise themselves with each university.

Year 12

Year 12 have hit the ground running in Term 3. UAC/SRS/EAS, early entry and scholarship applications are all open and students are in the middle of finalising applications. I am regularly seeing students ensuring they are on track and supported. If parents wish to speak to the Careers Adviser please phone the school to make an appointment. Other Careers events happening in Term 3 include Year 12 U@Uni students completing their final workshops with UTS, university and TAFE lunch presentations, UAC Q&A sessions with the Careers Advisers and a variety of online webinar/workshops that students can attend and join. All information is advertised on the Year 12 Careers Google classroom. Students are reminded to check this regularly. Late last term, selected Year 12 students attended Western Sydney University's Fast Forward Conference at the Parramatta South campus. The students have been a part of this university program since Year 10, and this was the final event for them. Students were able to tour the campus, learn more about specific degrees, ask questions to current university students and staff and most importantly, gain an understanding of what university life would be like for them. The students' behaviour was exemplary, and feedback was very positive. There is an up-and-coming UNSW workshop for Year 11 and more programs available for junior students.

Year 12 students are to complete the DATA form on the Welfare page as well as complete their applications for EAS, SRS and Scholarships. It's a busy time with examinations and assessments before the HSC begins. Year 12 are encouraged to see me to discuss any matter in the Careers Office. Wishing you the best of luck in your endeavours beyond high school.
