#### **RELIEVING PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

#### Dear Parents,

There have been many engaging activities across the school community from the Year 8 swim school program, Year 11 VET Work Ready Day, University link programs, Year 12 VET Work Placements to Study Skills sessions for Years 7, 8, 9 10, 11 and 12. It has been a jam-packed term so far for 2024.

#### **NAPLAN** Testing

Years 7 and 9 will have engaged with their NAPLAN testing across Weeks 7 and 8 of this term. All NAPLAN testing elements have been online for the first time at Birrong Girls this year. NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. Students have completed assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language punctuation) (spelling, grammar and and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to Australian the Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

## International Women's Day - Friday 8 March 2024

Congratulations to all students who have been fostering this year's theme for International Women's Day: Inspire Inclusion. The first International Women's Day was started by the suffragettes in 1911 whom were very conscious of the fact that they were left behind politically, socially and economically. The suffragettes had vigorously campaigned for the right to vote in public elections in Europe since the late-19th Century. All women in Britain were finally given the right to vote in 1928. Suffrage for women in Australia was much earlier: in 1902 women over 21 could vote in elections for the federal parliament. While the vast majority of women across the world now have the right to vote, there is still much work to be done to ensure that no woman is left behind and all women deserve the right to be included. Our SRC members led the way with International Women's Day fundraising to support women in need.

Our Prefects and SRC leaders were extraordinary ambassadors for our school at the various IWD events linked to Parliament House. The Zonta International Women's Day breakfast was held at Bankstown Girls High School on Friday 8 March and attended by Alexis Acheampong and Ms Blue.

#### Harmony Day

This year's theme is 'everyone belongs'. Australia is a multicultural country with nearly 50% of Australians born overseas or having at least one parent born overseas. Birrong Girls is proudly multicultural: 94% of our students are from Non-English Speaking Backgrounds representing

a vibrant mix of over 40 different language groups. Harmony Day is a time to celebrate our school value of understanding, tolerance and inclusion on Thursday 21 March.

#### **Building Update**

The new build is progressing well with the build team working on the three-storey building as well as the multi-purpose hall simultaneously. The construction site changes from day to day with all the work that is occurring.

#### Unapproved leave

Please be aware that unapproved leave will generate warning letters for students who miss assessment tasks or examinations in Years 10, 11 and 12.

#### Safe driving

Parents please take care to follow the rules of the road when dropping off and picking up your child and ensure the safety of all our students. The safety of our students is of paramount concern to us all; however, reckless and bad driving at the front of the school continues to put our girls at risk. With the additional traffic of large trucks due to the new school upgrades there are greater risks if we are not driving to the specific road rules when navigating pick up and drop off. Remember that the car parks on the school grounds are for teachers only.

We invite all parents to meet with the teachers on **Tuesday 26 March** for the parent/teacher interviews; our teachers greatly appreciate your interest and involvement. Taking an active interest in your daughter's education and developing a positive home-school relationship greatly assists your daughter achieve to the best of her ability.

action. Congratulations to our school captain, Catherine, for making it to the final round of the MWLP VET Awards for her outstanding work placement experience in VET Entertainment. We are so proud of you!





Year 11 students have commented on how much work they are doing during the early stage of their journey towards the HSC in 2024. The Year 11 VET (Vocational Education Training) students completed their

'Work Ready' day to prepare themselves for the 70 hours of mandatory work placement that will begin during Term 2 for the Retail Cert III, Business Services Cert III and the Hospitality Cert I students. They have also participated in their *Study Skills* 

program, where students were supported in gaining greater insights into effective study habits. Selected Year 11 students have continued supporting the Year 7 students in the Peer Support Program this term and will continue to provide support to their Year 7 groups into Term 2. A special congratulations to Sammi who was the worthy recipient of the University of Sydney Academic Award at our presentation day last year and was officially recognised in the beautiful Great

Hall at the University of Sydney last month. A further congratulations to Alexis who received a Zonta Citizenship Award at Zonta's Annual International Women's Day Breakfast in partnership with Bankstown Girls High School. These students are such



outstanding representatives of our school!

Year 10 has recently participated in their Study Skills program which introduces effective study techniques and time management skills as well as providing students with tips to build their confidence and



increase their motivation to learn. Congratulations also to our first, second and third place winners of the Year 10 Henrietta Wooster speeches finals – Inez, Kayla and Aurora. The topic for 2024 was: "The best things in life are free".

**Year 9** students are enjoying having a greater variety of subjects as they begin their elective courses. They are also scheduled to participate in their study skills program this term which aims to develop skills to organise their home learning and maximise their school achievement. As the year progresses there will be increased opportunity for Year 9 students to take on some of the leadership roles in the school's extra-curricular clubs and teams. For Year 9, NAPLAN testing took place during Weeks 7 and 8 of this term. This testing provides vital information for your child's teachers so they can cater for individual student needs.

understand the expectations we have of students at Birrong GHS. For Year 7, NAPLAN testing took place during Weeks 7 and 8 of this term. This testing provides

#### **HSC Minimum Standards**

Students will meet the HSC minimum standard through short online tests in reading, writing and numeracy. Tests can be taken in Years 10, 11 or 12 and will be again organised here at school. Students can take the test more than once if they need to. We will provide more advice about achieving the minimum standards throughout the year.

#### Homework and Revision

A reminder that all students are expected to complete homework. This includes formal work set by teachers as well as revision and wide reading. The following guidelines indicate the number of hours students in various years should set aside for homework:

- Years 7 and 8: 2 hours each night
- Years 9 and 10: 2-3 hours each night
- Years 11 and 12: 3-4 hours each night

This type of commitment leads to success through school and beyond. Remember: every huge success story is the result of a series of little choices.

#### **Careers Facts**

I would like to congratulate the 2023 cohort for their excellent achievements during their final year.

We have had amazing results and university placements across NSW.

Through hard work, dedication, planning and early offer schemes we placed 15 students at Macquarie University, 39 students at Western Sydney campuses across NSW, 16 students at UTS, 9 students at UNSW and so far, one confirmed placement at the University of Sydney studying a Bachelor/Masters in Pharmacy.

These are amazing results for students who were aiming for university pathways in 2023.

We have had many successful TAFE applications with career opportunities in Youth Work, Pathology



(blood collection and sterilization), Dental Assisting and Beauty and Laser course to name a few.

Here is a snippet of student placements in 2024. There were 109 students in the Year 12, 2023 cohort and these are their destination acceptances.

Welcome to Careers News Year 12 cohort of 2024.

Google classrooms are for students, make sure you are in this classroom. I will be providing you with valuable information throughout the year. This is the fastest and most efficient way to follow and stay in touch with all future pathways and news.

Year 12 Fast Forward students had the privilege of attending a university day at Western Sydney University Parramatta South Campus on 21 February. Students were provided with a tour, lunch and lectures in preparation for their future at university. A combination of 78 schools were welcomed and over 1200 students attended this rewarding experience as part of the Fast Forward program which they began when they were in Year 9.

Year 12 will be involved in Careers talks early next term. These sessions will be hosted by Ms Shinas and will run in the afternoons. The time will be announced in the next few weeks. These sessions will help Year 12 understand the UAC process and how applications are made to universities. Early applications, EAS and SRS as well as scholarships will be discussed. All students are welcome to attend as they are critical sessions supporting the transition from school to future pathways.







#### Year 11

Congratulations to the Year 11 students who are involved in the very successful U@Uni program lead by our UTS ambassadors. This program has been running for 6 successful years and we are pleased to open this pathway up to future UTS students.

UNSW offered nine Year 11 students the opportunity to take part in the UNSE Gateway Leaders Program. This was an exciting opportunity for students to travel to UNSW and represent the school in critical thinking and skills programs. The workshops will focus on harnessing the leadership strengths of students.

Congratulations to Sarah Ali, Ferdos Haidar, Namariq Al-Janabi, Haajar Enad, Sherine Dennaoui, Shereen Ibrahim, Roukaya Ramlawie, Genevieve Balden and Madison Balden who applied and were selected for the program.

The Gateway program was hosted on the UNSW campus in Kensington on 19 March.

#### Year 10

This year I will be delivering careers classes to Year 10. We will focus on pathways, subject selections, resumes and job applications. Students will be informed about Leadership Week and work experience.

Students involved in the Fast Forward program with Western Sydney University will continue their exciting program in 2024.

Sydney University is offering a workshop for Year 10 Work Education students to partake in university lectures and tutorials. This program is called Future Focus and will be running on 3 April 2024. This will be an interesting and informative day out for our students.

#### Year 9

Year 9 students can join the Fast Forward program, led by Western Sydney University. We have been in a partnership with this university for 8 successful years. ### Social Science celebration of International Women's Day.

Year 10 **Commerce** completed a task on wellknown female entrepreneurs. They learned about their achievements, contributions, challenges overcome and the impact on the business world and society. The task motivated students on how to be resilient and with hard work and commitment they can be one of the well-known entrepreneurs in future.







Students in Social Science learned and researched the important role of women leaders in society in the areas of human and environmental wellbeing, business entrepreneurship and law. Students in **Legal Studies** learned of the important role the women in international law and the development of contemporary Human Rights.

Students also learned about the importance of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the important role played by the First Lady of US Eleanor Roosevelt as the first appointed Chairperson of the Commission on Human Rights. She played a fundamental role in the development of the UNDHR, an important international law which has been an important source of law in shaping the development of the Australian legal system. Australia's signing of the UNDHRs led to the creation of the Australian Human Rights Commission and other important pieces of legalisations which protect rights and reduces discrimination, such as the Sex Discrimination Act and the Native Title Act.



Students in Legal Studies watched the video, "The Women who shaped the Universal Declaration of Human Rights."

In **Business Services** our Year 11 students used their business software skills to research important women in the business industry. They created posters using their CANVAS software skills and knowledge of the importance of generating different documents for different purposes and audiences. The girls developed their laminating skills and practiced laminating their posters to put them up to display outside the Social Science staffroom.







#### **Retail Services**

Year 12 Retail Services students learned how to use Point-of-Sale (POS). In a simulated store environment students learned how to add items to the POS, how to scan the items, give returns and refunds and to organise a cash float at the beginning of the day. These important Retail skills help the students gain real life experiences which will be beneficial for them in working in the Retail industry.







Year 11 Retail Services students learned a very important skill of gift wrapping and displaying gifts in an attractive manner which will be appealing to customers. For some students it was their first experience to wrap gifts and they thoroughly enjoyed and learned this important skill. This will be beneficial for all students who are planning to work in Retail and will also be helpful in their daily lives.

# THE FACTS ABOUT VAPING

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes, often called 'vapes', are electronic devices designed to deliver vapourised liquids into the lungs. There are many different styles of vapes available and they can be difficult to spot.

The main ingredient in vapes is propylene glycol, vegetable glycerine or glycerol, and they often also contain nicotine, flavours and other chemicals. Vapes may contain harmful chemicals that aren't listed on the pack.

The biggest misunderstanding about vapes is that they are harmless compared to cigarettes. This is not true. *Vapes are not safe.*
