#### **REPORT FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPALS**

Welcome back to Term 4, a time to work hard towards future goals.

Many thanks to the parents and community members who have already taken the time to respond to the survey. The information provided by you helps us to understand more about your child's experience at school and confirm our school's areas of strength as well as areas for us to focus on in the future.

We wish all the 2024 Year 12 students the very best as they embark on their HSC examinations. These examinations end their secondary schooling and prepare them for continued success in future endeavours. So many of the girls have received early entry to university, congratulations girls. Good luck in your HSC examinations! Year 12 should review the Year 12 Welfare Google classroom for updates regarding the formal and sign out processes.



Our Year 11 students have completed their yearly examinations at the end of last term, and they have already begun their preparation for the HSC in 2025. Students have received their reports and should spend some time reflecting on their performance. Students are encouraged to seek assistance from their teachers to identify how they could achieve improvement as they embark on their Year 12 course of study. The Year 12 Handbook (assessment outline and HSC processes) has been distributed and students are encouraged to plan their term carefully, taking note of when assessment tasks are due and ensuring that they are well organised to complete all required work.

Students are reminded to adhere to school procedures for assessment tasks and examinations which are explained in the handbook. Nightly study habits and a clear focus on completing work to develop deep understanding are essential in achieving the best possible future

outcomes. It is also important that students achieve a balance between family, study and extracurricular activities. Students should get the right amount of sleep and rest, as this often impacts on the effectiveness of your study routines. If students have trouble maintaining a balance, or need assistance with setting goals, we encourage them to be proactive and seek help from Ms Rothwell, Ms Haken, Ms Salvagio, Ms Tselepi, Ms Ferris or Ms Blue.

Throughout Term 4 Year 10 students are expected to continue working diligently, making sure they complete all class and assessment tasks to a high standard to ensure they achieve all course outcomes. Students should also be preparing for their Year 10 formal exams which will be held during Week 4. All Year 10 students have now chosen their preliminary HSC subjects for Year 11 2025. Students were required to reflect on their selections and consider if their choices were best suited to their capabilities and future career aspirations. It is important that students listen to the ongoing advice from staff and continue to make effective decisions allowing them to achieve to the best of their ability. For some students, the prospect of gaining a traineeship or apprenticeship (working and undergoing training whilst being paid) may be a more appealing and appropriate pathway. Parents/Carers of Year 10 students considering an alternate pathway are encouraged to make an appointment to discuss the best options and opportunities for success post Year 10 with Ms Shinas, the school's Transition / Careers Adviser.

Year 9 students are encouraged to continue to engage with their learning for the remainder of the school year in preparation for Year 10 in 2025. Students received their NAPLAN results in late July. These results allow parents/carers to reflect on some areas of their child's progress in literacy and numeracy and allow teachers to plan to further develop literacy and numeracy skills through targeted teaching practices.

Year 8 students are also encouraged to ensure they complete all the required tasks and prepare for their yearly examinations. It is important for all students to attend school every day as we progress through Term 4. All Year 8 students have selected their Year 9 elective subjects for 2025. These electives will continue to be studied in Year 10 2026.

Year 7 students also received their NAPLAN results in late July. To improve, it is vital that parents provide an environment that encourages regular reading which will assist students to improve their comprehension as well as vocabulary. Preparation for yearly examinations is also important for all the students to prioritise.



Parents are reminded that the Homework Centre is available to complete work and seek assistance when they experience

difficulty. It operates on site Tuesday through Thursday and is supervised by qualified teachers from the school. This term will be a busy time studying for and completing assessment tasks, and preparing for yearly examinations. Now is the time to work especially hard to ensure that reports reflect students' efforts and capabilities.

Every day your child should be spending a minimum of 2 hours on her homework, assignments and revision as well as extra time for study and reading. To help students, parents should discuss their work and outwardly show interest in their learning. This could involve regularly asking them about their learning and helping them to establish a study plan to achieve their goals. Successful students always identify family support as a key element to achieving their success and acknowledge the support accordingly.

### THE TELL THEM FROM ME PARENT SURVEY (TERM 4, 2024)

This term, our school will be participating in the *Partners in Learning* parent survey, another part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys (student, teacher and parent surveys) on student engagement. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The parent survey will be conducted between Wednesday 16 October to Friday 8 November. It can be completed entirely online on smartphones, iPads, tablets, laptops or computers at home, on a public computer or you can come into the school between 2pm and 3:30pm for assistance. The survey will typically take 15 minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. Although participating in the survey is entirely voluntary, your responses are very much appreciated.

#### The Resilience Project

Our school continues to deliver the **The Resilience Project (TRP)** to all our students as the program is committed to **teaching positive mental health strategies** to prevent mental ill-health and **build young people's capacity to deal with adversity.** 

Our teachers and students engage in weekly lessons and activities around the key principles of Gratitude, Empathy, Mindfulness (GEM), and Emotional Literacy to build resilience. There are many ways that GEM can be used with families at home to reinforce the strategies being taught at school to increase student well-being and resilience. Maintaining attendance over 90% is extremely important. Many students from Years 7 to 11 are

congratulated and are being recognised for their high levels of attendance for Term 3. Students with 100% attendance during Term 3 are awarded the certificate of merit and those with above 95% attendance are given with a recognition award. Good attendance enhances student learning and achievement.

All students should be at school every day unless they are sick or require medical attention. Every student can improve their attendance percentage by coming to school every day from this point on. Look at this example to see how every student can make great improvement - if in Semester 1 you had 10 days absent, then you have an attendance rate at 89% attendance. If you have no more absences in Term 3 then your 10 days absent will put you at 93% attendance. If you have no more absences in Term 4 then your 10 days absent will put you at 95% attendance. That is, you attended 184 days out of 194 school days over the year in 2024. Improve your attendance, start from today.

#### **School Vaccinations**

The last school vaccination day for this year will be on Thursday 28 November for Year 7 and Year 10 catch-ups for students who were absent on the previous day of vaccinations.

Parents can register their consent online or through a hard copy consent form that was issued to Year 7 earlier this year.

#### How to provide consent:

1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit:

- Follow the steps to log in to your existing ServiceNSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a <u>ServiceNSW</u> account, refer to <u>ServiceNSW</u> to create one.
- 3. Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your daughter(s). You will need to:
  - a) Enter your daughter's personal details
  - b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your daughter
  - c) Read the <u>linked Parent Information</u> <u>Sheet and privacy statement</u>
  - d) Provide consent

If you and your daughter do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form from Ms Salvagio at the Learning Support Staffroom.

## **School Student Travel**



#### School student travel information for parents and students

#### **School Travel Passes**

Applications are now open for 2025 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their School Opal card at their nominated postal address from mid-January 2025.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

Students living in rural and regional areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. Note: some rural and regional operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

#### **Terms of Use**

Students using School Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use.

This includes travel within the approved times between 6.30am and 7.00pm from Monday to Friday on school days only. Students must use their Child/Youth Opal card for any travel outside these times.

All students are required to comply with the <u>Student code of conduct</u>. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.
